BRAUNSTONE TOWN COUNCIL MINUTES OF CITIZENS' ADVISORY PANEL THURSDAY 2nd MARCH 2023

PRESENT: Councillor Leanne Lee (Vice Chair in the Chair), Councillor Darshan Singh and local residents Jeanette Essex and Talent Nuyandoro.

Officers in Attendance: Pauline Snow, Deputy Chief Executive & Community Services Manager.

Darren Tilley, Chief Executive & Town Clerk and local resident, John Dodd joined remotely via Zoom and Video Conferencing.

1. Apologies

No apologies for absence were received.

2. Disclosures of Interest

There were no disclosures of interest.

3. Minutes of Meeting

The panel received the Minutes of the meeting held on 24th November 2022 in order to confirm their accuracy and be signed by the Chairperson (item 3 on the agenda).

AGREED that the minutes of the meeting held on the 24th November 2022 be approved and signed by the Chairperson.

4. Library Opening Times

Panel members reviewed the current opening times of the Braunstone Community Library following the Library Consultative Panel's proposal to amend the library opening times.

It was noted that the library currently opened until 7pm on Mondays and closed at 12pm on Wednesday mornings. It was proposed that the library closed at 6pm on Mondays due to very few people using the library after 6pm but extend the Wednesday opening hours to 1pm as it is very busy on Wednesday mornings with the coffee morning. A consultation was being undertaken with users and residents on the proposals that closed on 8th March. To date, 22 responses had been received with all being in favour of the proposed changes to opening times.

Agreed that the proposed changes to the opening times be supported.

5. Shakespeare Park Play Area Improvements

The panel members received an update on proposals along with the proposed layouts to improve the play facilities at Shakespeare Park.

It was noted that the park area was a large area and would include refurbishment of existing equipment, installation of new play equipment, agility trail and sensory garden. The sensory garden and new play equipment would be suitable for children with physical disabilities and learning difficulties in order for the whole family to play together.

An application for funding was currently being prepared for submission to the National Lottery to help with the costs of the work.

Agreed that the designs and proposals be supported.

6. Braunstone Village Conservation Area Extension

The panel members received an update on the progress with proposals to extend the Braunstone Village Conservation Area to the South of Braunstone Lane.

Little progress had been made to date on the proposal but an agreement in principle had been made with Leicester City Council to consider the Conservation area as a whole rather than two separate areas. Leicester City Council already had in house expertise in managing a conservation area and a review of the existing conservation area on the City side of Braunstone Lane was due for consideration.

Blaby District Council had recently recruited a new member of staff with heritage experience to oversee the conservation area proposal but to date no further progress had been made with the project.

The Town Council's Planning and Environment committee would review progress at the April meeting and consider contacting Blaby District Council if no further progress was made in order to ensure the project moved forward.

The meeting closed at 8:05pm.

Matters Raised by Residents attending the meeting

Panel Members queried the planning application for communications mast proposed to be installed on Kingsway which had recently been sent to the Secretary of State for an appeal decision. It was understood that local residents owned the Kingsway and could therefore refuse the installation of the mast on the land.

Panel members discussed enclosed areas for dog walking. It was noted that the new open space at Thorpe Astley would contain a fenced area for dog walking and would be easily accessible once the new Walking and Cycling route was completed through Mossdale Meadows and Meridian Leisure Park.

Welcome to our Annual Report 2023

Despite these challenging times, the Town Council continues to provide important services to the community, this Annual Report provides a summary of our achievements during 2022/2023 and looks ahead to our aspirations for the next 12 months.

A full list of our achievements is set out overleaf, however, I wish to reflect on a three of them here.

This year work commenced on improving Walking and Cycling Connections; with the new pathway through Mossdale Meadows completed. The next stages include the path being linked through Meridian Leisure. Further works are due to be carried out later this year to improve the pathway and crossing points along Meridian Way. This is a significant development for our community providing better access to Meridian Leisure and Business Park for Braunstone Town residents and to the Civic Centre/Library and Mossdale Meadows for Thorpe Astley residents. Work to improve access to Aylestone Meadows from Kingsway is also due to take place this year.



The new Pavilion facility, site improvements and refurbished tennis courts at Shakespeare Park have been fully completed and delivered under budget by £32,735. The Council and the sports clubs hosted a successful community open day in June showcasing our new Sports Pavilion facilities. Work is underway on the future management arrangements with the Sports Clubs to enable the new Pavilion facility to be available for hire and community use during the coming year. Also in the coming year we aim to deliver the final stage of our improvements: refurbishment of the playground, which includes the installation of sensory play equipment, providing for those children with special needs to play alongside their siblings.

With finance and contractors now in place, in the summer of 2023 we will be installing solar PV panels on our buildings and an air source heat pump at Thorpe Astley Community Centre. With energy bills increasing this project has become a top priority for the Council, not only in response to the challenges of climate change but also to protect the Council's finances and to avoid excessive Council Tax increases.




BRAUNSTONE TOWN COUNCIL ACHIEVEMENTS 2022/2023

- · Completed the second phase of the Shakespeare Park Improvements with the refurbishment of the Park Tennis Courts;
- · Opened the New Shakespeare Pavilion building and site for use by the sports clubs; with a successful community open day in June 2022;
- · Supported the sports clubs at Shakespeare Park to grow with one-off grant fund;
- · Further invested in and enhanced tennis provision through
 Tap4Tennis; rolling out the scheme at Shakespeare Park tennis courts;
- · Approved designs and received tenders for improvements to the Culvert and bridge over Lubbesthorpe Brook at Mossdale Meadows.

Delivery Objectives for 2023/2024:

- Complete Phase 3 of the Shakespeare Park refurbishment: Playground.
- Open the New Shakespeare Pavilion building for use by the community.
- Support existing Clubs at Shakespeare Park to grow while supporting new sporting activities, such as Tennis and Pétanque.
- Invest in Thorpe Astley Park Tennis Courts and deliver tennis initiatives to enhance participation.
- Continue to work with Blaby District Council and the developer to ensure improvements are made to the culvert at Thorpe Astley Park.
- Carry out repairs to the Culvert and Bridge at Mossdale Meadows.
- Refurbish and enhance Impey Close Play Area and surrounding open space.

Item 5 – Braunstone Town Council Surveys

Purpose

To consider a programme of surveys.

Background

Following many years of undertaking Annual Surveys with residents of Braunstone Town, the Policy & Resources meeting held on 1st November 2018 agreed that the Annual Survey be discontinued (Minute 48, resolution 1) and that it be replaced by regular smaller surveys undertaken online to ascertain satisfaction and feedback in specific areas.

Surveys would also be undertaken following the introduction of new services or changes to current services and could also include surveys to ascertain the need and type of community initiatives that residents require. For example, a survey could be undertaken following completion of the new Shakespeare pavilion or changes occurring in Customer Services or to see what activities and groups are looking to attend following the pandemic. The annual prize draw, taken from responses received from all the surveys undertaken for the year (subject to contact details being included in the response), could continue. The surveys would be undertaken via social media, the Town Council website, Survey Monkey and paper surveys available at the centres and the library.

A recent proposal was made to the Town Council to consider a Conservation area on Braunstone Lane and following detailed reports and discussion with Blaby District Council, a consultation was undertaken with local residents on the proposed plans.

We have also undertaken surveys on the proposed Environment & Biodiversity Strategy in March 2022 and on proposed changes to the Braunstone Town Community Library opening hours in February 2023.

Action requested

To consider and comment on proposed suggestions for smaller, snap surveys.

- 1. To consider appropriate events, services or circumstances when short surveys could be undertaken to gauge residents' views and suggestions.
- 2. To consider the type of information the Town Council should be collecting from the short surveys.

Item 7 - Shakespeare Park Improvement Project

Purpose

To receive an update on progress with improvements to the play facilities and Future Management arrangements for the Pavilion at Shakespeare Park.

Background

On 2nd March 2023, the Panel received an update on proposals to improve the play facilities at Shakespeare Park and to comment on the proposals.

Phase 1 of the improvements to Shakespeare Park, pavilion and site improvements, and phase 2, tennis courts improvements, have both been completed and there was a total underspend against the agreed budgets of £26,057 on phase 1 and £6,678 on phase 2.

Phase 3 – Playground Improvements

The improvement works involve:

- 1. providing and installing Sensory Play Equipment;
- 2. providing and installing new swings and removing existing swings;
- 3. providing and installing new spinning equipment;
- 4. installation of an Astroturf fitness trail;
- 5. refurbishment of existing equipment;
- 6. replacement of existing safety surfaces with Bonded Rubber Mulch; and
- 7. installation and realignment of access with new gates and boundary fencing.

The proposed layout is attached at Appendix 1 and illustration of how the refurbished playground may look is attached at Appendix 2.

Total costs for the refurbishment of the playground, including the installation of new safety surfaces, sensory garden and agility trail, is £64,295.

The table below sets out the funding secured to undertake the project.

The Council needs to undertake decibel readings for the proposed musical, drum and chime panels for the sensory garden. The contractor attempted to undertake these at locations where they have been installed; however, the readings aren't definitive because of there being a number of variables. The contractor has submitted alternative proposals for play panels rather than musical items. A comparison between the agreed Sensory Play Area and a proposed alternative is set out at Appendix 3.

Future Management Arrangements

The Shakespeare Park Management Association was established on Monday 27th March 2023. The Committee appointed a Chair, Treasurer and Secretary. The Committee also adopted a constitution and authorised the Treasurer to set up a Bank Account.

On 11th May, the Committee of the Management Association approved the Licence to Occupy and Manage the Pavilion, which takes effect on 1st June 2023 for a period of 10 years. The Management Association have also asked the Council to administer the bookings for the Clubroom.

Timescales

Timescales are attached at Appendix 4.

Action Requested

- 1. Consider and comment on the alternative equipment for the sensory play area;
- Note that the Shakespeare Park Sports Pavilion is now being run by a Management Association made up of representatives from the Clubs and the Council.
